Year 8 children Immunisation

Introduction of a universal Human Papillomavirus Infection immunisation

The Government announced in July 2018 to extend the HPV vaccination to boys, with effect from 1 September 2019, based on the advice of the Joint Committee of Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI). The vaccination programme will now be offered to any individual who is in school year 8.


Key points that are useful to know about the changes to the programme:

- The same vaccine that is currently used for the girls' programme (Gardasil®, which protects against HPV types 6,11,16,18) will be used for the universal programme.
- For practical reasons, any individual in school year 8, (regardless of their date of birth), will be offered HPV immunisation.
- A second dose will be offered either within the same school year (separated by a minimum of 6 months), or in the following year.
- A catch-up programme for older boys will not be offered.

PE Review

Glendale Middle School has been very busy since April; we've competed in a multitude of different sporting events with good success in all and occasionally, outstanding results. Once again, the wide variety of sports competitions and outdoor activities that Glendale Middle School participate in has had a tremendous impact on the pupils.

Area Volleyball Championships – four teams from years 7 and 8 contested this tournament. Both girls and boys teams won their overall competitions and qualified for the Northumberland School Games.

Swimming Gala – the swimming gala capped off a very busy SAT's week. Nearly every pupil from Glendale was involved and Mr Pickup, Mrs Harrison and Mrs Brown were very pleased with the effort and ability put forward.

Cricket – since Easter Tom Vickers has been coming into school on Wednesday afternoons to run a cricket club along-side Mr Pickup. This has paid dividends with all of Glendale's teams performing well at their respective Area competitions. Our Key Stage 2 boys actually won their tournament outright and will represent the county at the regional finals at Stocksfield Cricket Club; well done boys.

Finally – this term included the athletics calendar. As usual Glendale took a strong team to the Area Championships at Berwick, qualifying 38 athletes for the next round. The Inter-Area was held at Glendale Middle School and Glendale took advantage of their home field. We managed to qualify 18 athletes to the County Championships at Gateshead Stadium. Stand out performers included Lily Mae T, Olivia P, David T, Kayla B and Will M; all were victorious in multiple events.

On Saturday the 22nd of June, Glendale athletes travelled to Gateshead to compete in the annual Track and Field County Championships. The competition was hard but we still managed to get 7 top 3 finishes and 12 top 5. Mrs Simpson and Mr Pickup were proud of all performances. Athletes of particular note were Lily Mae T who made the final in the yr7 100m, 200m and long jump, Olivia P who finished 2nd and 4th respectively in the yr7 Javelin and Discus, Will M who finished second in the Yr6 Boys High Jump and the Yr7 girls relay team who took 3rd place in the 4x100m.

Science Update

Children across the Middle School have had the opportunity to take part in free Engineering & Science workshops this term. Both days allowed pupils to meet scientists and discover "real life" examples of how topics we cover in school can be used in science and engineering careers.

In the Mega Machines workshop, year 5 had great fun exploring forces with a day of hands on practical activities including circus skills, building gears, pulleys, levels and finally a custard pie throwing machine!

The Energiser Challenge workshops saw years 6, 7 & 8 working in teams to build a mini electric car. They were presented with a range of real life engineering design problems to solve based around power, friction and energy efficiency, and how this can affect the design of a vehicle

Members of STEM club also completed an engineering challenge - to design and build a model of a hand washing device for a school in Kenya. Pupils had to work together to share ideas, work within a budget and make sure that their creations actually worked. They discovered that problem solving and team work are just as important as building and design skills, and earned a CREST Discovery certificate in the process.


Singularly, they may only take a few minutes, but collectively they waste a huge amount of staff time which should be used more effectively in dealing with other school business.
