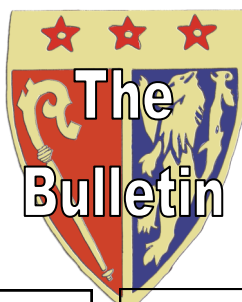

Absences and Late Arrivals

Head Lice

We have identified a couple of cases of headlice here in school. As this is a condition which spreads easily and rapidly we are reminding all families of the importance of checking their child's hair regularly. Checking for headlice is a simple procedure using a special comb that can be obtained from supermarkets or the chemist. All family members will need to be checked too.

Advice from health professionals is to only treat where 'live' lice are seen. Further advice on treatment and prevention can be obtained at the chemist or online using the following NHS link: <https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/head-lice-and-nits/>

If a child is found to have head lice in school parents will be informed immediately by telephone. A joint decision between home and school will then be made regarding the best course of action to deal with the problem. Suitable treatment should take place as soon as possible – once treated children are able to come straight back to school.

Artsmark Update

As part of our ongoing art project with Woodhorn Colliery and Archives, funded for three years through the "Start Art" initiative, Year 7 and Year 8 spent two days working with artist Amy Lord last week.

Amy worked with pupils in developing an art installation for the forest area titled "Letters to the Artist." Pupils used collage techniques to create individual pieces of work that were later suspended as a collective art work installation in the forest area, using wire and ribbon. The work undertaken with Amy and the pupil's learning during these two days will contribute to each pupil's individual progress in achieving the Art Council's Bronze Level Art Award, a nationally recognised art qualification. Year 7 and 8 children, not attending the Summer Term residential trip, will have a further day at Woodhorn on 25th June, where all the schools involved will come together to celebrate the work so far and will have the chance to participate in a further workshop with artists.

More exciting arty events are planned for June! Next term, we have invited two artists from "Drywater Arts" in Amble into school to work with pupils from each year group across both schools for a full week. During this week, pupils will learn Shibori fabric dyeing techniques, using the fabric they fold and dye to create kites and banners. This project, entitled "Enfolding" has been aimed at uniting our two schools even more closely through this collaborative project.

All of this art work will be on view for families during an Art Celebration event, planned for the end of July. On this day pupils, families and the community can come together to celebrate all of the wonderful work that has been undertaken this year. The event will also be including musical performances by pupils from both schools, a chance to view and purchase framed art work from pupils of both schools in a BIG art exhibition and kite flying! There will also be living sculpture demonstrations, which pupils will have devised with performance and dance artist Lynn Campbell. Lynn will also be running free aerial gymnastics and circus skills workshops for everyone to try!

Sport Report

Cross Country - On the 15th of January 2019, Glendale took 16 athletes to South Shields to represent North Northumberland in a National Cross Country Qualification race. In winter conditions, all athletes performed very well. In the junior girls' race, Alyssia McF lead Glendale home, finishing 38th out of 103 runners. Will M was the leading runner in the Junior Boys' for Glendale, breaking the top 50 a year young. Eva M and Grace W both finished in the top 50 in the combined Year 8 and 9 race.

Junior Netball (22.3.18) - Glendale took two teams to the Senior Area Netball at Tweedmouth. The Year 5 team finished 2nd winning all but 1 game and showed real ability towards the later rounds. The Year 8 team performed very well, winning 3 matches and remained unbeaten throughout the whole tournament, ultimately taking victory. They continued their fine run of form defeating a very strong Berwick Middle School 4 – 1. Victory was also shared by our year 7 girls netball team who defeated Berwick 9-4 and have only lost one game all season.

Year 5 get creative with kites

Year 7 Technology

The other half of the year group have taken on the challenge of learning to make a bird box following a super visit to Ford & Etal Sawmill at the start of the term (special thanks again to Mr Nevins for hosting us). They have worked brilliantly and should be very proud of their finished work - they will be bringing them home today to enable them to put them up for the birds. Hopefully they will soon be occupied as our local birds start nesting.



Yr6 Textiles Project

This term the Year 6 students have put into practice their previous learning decorating and working with textiles. They have worked really well in spite of ongoing challenges with our sewing machines (one or two individuals became known as 'destroyers of the machines!'). The finished sports bags are really impressive with some stunning tie-dye designs. Well done to all of the children for their success in this tricky project.



British Science Week

British Science Week took place from 6th - 15th March. This year, pupils were challenged to use scientific skills to investigate and solve problems. Year 5 explored the properties of unusual materials such as cornflour paste and discovered that some liquids can behave like solids! Year 6 investigated the ways in which animals adapt to survive in their environment and designed their own animals to suit a specific habitat. Year 7 and 8 investigated which factors can speed up or slow down chemical reactions by carrying out some very good practical work based on the Iodine Clock experiment. A poster competition was held across school and the five best will be entered into the national British Science Week competition - the topic this year was Journeys. Screen Time for Children

As you may have heard in the news, a report has been published by the UK's four chief medical officers on the impact of screen-based activities on children and young people's wellbeing. When they acknowledge that technology can be a wonderful thing, too much time sitting down or using mobile devices can get in the way of important, healthy activities.

Here are some of their tips for balancing screen use with healthy living.

- Getting enough, good quality sleep matters. Leave phones outside the bedroom when it is bedtime.
- Education matters. Make sure that you and your children are aware of and abide by their school's policy on screen time.
- Safety when out and about. Advise your children not to use their phone while crossing the road or doing an activity that requires a person's full attention.
- Enjoy screen-free meal. Talking as a family is very important for development.
- Talk to your children about sharing photos and information online and how photos and words are sometimes manipulated.
- Talking as a family about keeping safe online and about cyber-bullying and what children should do if they are worried.
- Keep moving! It's good to take a break after a couple of hours sitting or lying down using a screen.
- Use phone features to keep track of how much time is spent on screens or on social media.

A commentary by the chief medical officers that accompanies the guidelines also stressed that more research was needed. However, the officers said immediate action to safeguard young people is necessary by the government, social media platforms and technology companies. Among their suggestions are that the latter sign up to a voluntary code of conduct to protect children online, before the possible introduction of new laws.

Increasingly, mobile devices are the targets of malicious software so it's important that these also have adequate protection.

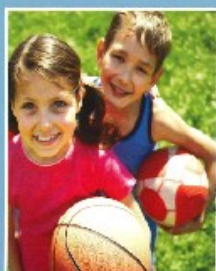
