Year 7 Birdbox Project

This term the Yr 7 technology project was making bird boxes. This project started with a visit to the sawmill at Etal where the children visited local woodland to meet the foresters and learn about sustainable woodland management. We enjoyed talking to the estate workers and watching them at work felling, shedding and moving timber. We then headed to the sawmill for a guided tour learning all about how the timber is processed and how products are made. At the end of the visit we were given timber boards from the sawmill to bring back to school to make into our bird boxes. Lots was learnt, skills developed and super bird boxes were made by all. A huge THANK YOU to everyone at the sawmill for allowing us to visit and for their generosity with their time and timber.

Glendale Middle School has been very busy since September 2019; we've competed in a multitude of different sporting events with good success in all and occasionally, outstanding results. Once again the wide variety of sports competitions and outdoor activities that Glendale Middle School participate in has once again had a tremendous impact on the pupils.

- Boys Area Rugby we took 2 teams to Longridge to compete in the rugby tournament, our year 7 boys and year 8 boys were fantastic, with the year 7 team winning all but 1 of their games, and taking second prize among strong opposition.
- The year 6 and 7 boys also played rugby matches against Berwick Middle School with both teams winning their matches.
- Glendale took senior football and netball teams to the Duchess High School. The football team won 8-0 and the senior girls also were victorious against older opposition.
- Girls Area Hockey we took 2 teams to the girls' area hockey tournament, all teams showed great attitude and endeavour and were rewarded with a top 3 finish in senior tournaments. Our senior girls were especially unlucky not to win but came up against a very strong Longridge team.
- Area Cross Country Championships (Longridge Towers – November 7th) – historically a strength of Glendale, this year was no different with over 40 athletes running at the area championships. With great effort we managed to qualify no fewer than 13 runners to take part in the County Finals and from this, runners can go on to compete on the national stage.

Water in school

As I am sure you already know keeping hydrated is a very important part of keeping healthy and being ready and able to learn. In school we expect all children to have a water bottle to enable them to keep hydrated throughout the school day. We have found that many children are not bringing a suitable water bottle to school which means keeping them hydrated is at times challenging.

With nearly 250 children across the schools jugs and cups are not a practical or hygienic option. We have considered how we can best address this to ensure children can access water through the day, that we do not have spills in lessons that could ruin children's hard work (this can be a sticky problem with squash and juice) and of course to ensure good levels of hygiene.

At the start of the new term in January every child will receive a water bottle (red tops for Wooler First & blue tops for Glendale). Funds for these bottles have kindly been donated by the PTA and Friends groups. The bottles are made from recycled & recyclable plastic and have a space printed for children's names. Children are expected to have these bottle in school each day taking them home each evening to be cleaned and back into school each morning full of fresh water for the day ahead. Children are able to re-fill their bottles from the two water coolers in our cloakrooms.

Drinks at lunchtime will also be changing with cups and water on every table at lunchtime for both school meals and packed lunches. Children will not be permitted to bring other drinks into school such as squash or use other bottles for their water.

Thank you for supporting us with this important aspect of the children's healthy lives at school.





Bikeabilty Week

Year 5 successfully completed Bikeability training in October. Some children achieved Level 1 and others achieved Level 2. All children who took part now have a much better understanding of how to stay safe on the roads. Well done Year 5!

Year 5 - Environment Agency

In Geography, Y5 have been studying rivers. Recently they have been studying how and why a river floods and the human and physical impact when it does.

A team from the Environment Agency paid Y5 a visit to show us how they can help. Y5 got to learn first hand how they help warn people there is danger by using megaphones, sirens and microphones. They then helped out releasing sandbags, pulling objects to safety and even got to try out a robot that could help in an emergency.

Inside the classroom, a flood resilience officer helped Y5 to understand what they could do to make our school flood proof, how to monitor changes and create a personal flood plan for our school.







First Aid Training



Our Year 7 students have been undertaking first aid training on Thursday mornings with Mr Deane-Hall. They have been learning to assess a casualty, get help and to perform CPR. As part of their training, our local first responder Mark came into school to teach them how to use an AED. Special thanks to Mark for the loan of the training manikins and also for coming into school to support the children's learning. 'The pantomime helped me a lot and brought out a more confident and creative side to me.' **Eden – The Fairy Godmother.**































The free app is designed for parents and carers of children aged 0-5 years and is available for download on mobile phones on Google Play or Apple's App Store under 'NHS child health'. This useful app offers easy to understand guidance on childhood illnesses, recognising when your child is unwell, and advice on when and where to seek further treatment.
