





Year 8 BBQ

We even had this fantastic feedback from the castle staff the following day:






Y4/Y5 Robinwood



On Friday 14th May, a number of Year 7 pupils began a four-day writing recovery project with a trip to Flodden Battlefield. The aim of the project was to use a stimulating creative experience to engage the pupils and to inspire them; this would then help them build confidence and would help generate examples of quality writing that the pupils could be proud of. While at Flodden, pupils met with Mr Hodgson who engaged them with his knowledge relating the battle and through explaining how he used the battle to inspire his novel "A Heron's Flight." Back in school, pupils participated in drama workshops led by Mr Hodgson and then art workshops led by Miss Hall. Pupils painted a large fabric map of the key sites and then used clay to create the heraldry of the noble families from both sides to position on the map. They also recreated the bloodied surcoat of James IV, which Catherine of Aragon had sent to Henry VIII in France as a gruesome trophy! It was a very successful project. Pupils showed huge progress in not only their writing but in their confidence and self-esteem also.

On Friday 14th May we visited Flodden battlefield learn about devastating defeat of the Scots. We came back to school to participate in drama, which was brilliant. The drama workshop was exhilarating; Mr Hodgson was an amazing actor! During the day I felt excited and relaxed. I would recommend visiting Flodden because it is an inspiring place.

Beamish

On Friday 5th July, we took Year 6 to Beamish as a trip to enrich their understanding of the Home Front during World War II. Pupils dressed as evacuees, gathered together their rationing-style packed lunches and set off on a journey to experience what life was like for children evacuated from inner city areas. They were "evacuated" to the 1940s Home Farm at Beamish where they participated in an Evacuee workshop led by Museum staff. During the workshop they practised marching and drill and wrote postcards home to their families. Thank you to all of the Year 6 families for the wonderful costumes- the children looked brilliant! Miss Hall

'We were evacuated to Beamish Home Farm on Monday 5th July. We wore evacuee clothes like what children wore then. On back outfits we also had tags and identity cards. We learned that they used to put tape on their windows to stop glass shattering during bomb blasts. We also learned that children would have had to collect the eggs, clean up the poo to use vegetable on the garden'.


'We were evacuated to Home Farm! When we were there, we learnt about he 'Dragon's Teeth' (concrete blocks) on Bamburgh beach that would be used to catch the German tanks. This was because Bamburah was in the top 10 of places the Germans planned to invade as it had wide sandy beaches. We also learnt drilling, marching and how the English soldiers saluted. We also found out that some evacuees were evacuated to Canada and one ship was sunk by German U-boats. Only 7 of the 100 children had survived. Life for evacuees was sometimes scary, siblings could be separated and sit for hours on a train'.

'At Beamish, I learned that the chemists had large jars of coloured water in the window so that people who couldn't read would know what diseases were in the town. I learned that evacuees would have had to clean out the poo from the animals, feed the animals and collect their produce for food. We also learned about the coal mines and how they mined them. The young miners would get paid 50 pence a week and they paid 48 pence to their mams. They would get 2 pence back to buy a large bag of sweets!

Year 5 Rivers trip - Breamish Valley

In Geography this term we have been studying rivers. We have been looking at their features, how humans use them, the journey of a river and so much more. We were lucky enough to have education officers from the Northumberland National Park in school to give us an overview of rivers. During this time we were able to use a parachute to help show how a river erodes and shapes the land. To make this learning real, Y5 were able to visit the Breamish Valley at a section of the River Breamish and spent the day

completing Geography fieldwork in the river.

Northumberland National Park led the session and as a class we recorded measurements of the rivers width, depth and speed. Also, we went river dipping and were able to use classification keys to find out what we had

caught. Jamie-Jay (5J) was lucky enough to catch a salmon and Zack (5M) caught a brown trout.

After a busy morning, we spent the afternoon walking up the hills to get a stunning view back down the valley. We then completed a field sketch and labelled the key features of the river that we could see. Sinead asked the park ranger to show her on an OS map the source of the River

Breamish which led to an impromptu map reading session.









Prime VR experience

We had the pleasure of welcoming Oliver from Prime VR (https://www.primevr.co.uk/) into school to take us on several virtual field trips across the world.

Year 5 visited the polar regions, Year 6 summited Everest, Year 7 went to the trenches of WW1 and the rainforest and Y8 were able to visit China and also see the impact of Climate Change. All of our visits linked to our current learning, previous learning or future learning and gave the children the chance to visit places we could only dream about.

Orla Y5 said, 'This is the best thing I've ever seen.' Robbie, also in Y5 said, 'It feels like I'm really there. I can't believe it.'

Due to the pandemic our usual trips and visits have been put on hold for over a year so this was the perfect opportunity for our children to visit somewhere different. The children gained so much knowledge from each experience, for example Y6's study on mountains took them to base camp Everest, Everest summit, K2, the Matterhorn and more. The children can't wait to hopefully do this again!














Duck Race 2021


